2003 The 25th Anniversary Year

This year began with a hectic round of competition. Inter-club galas, the Middlesex Championships, the Interhouse Gala and the first round of the Junior League all produced a high level of competition. The major anniversary celebrations were a photograph of about 160 swimmers, coaches and helpers, taken on one of the Interhouse Gala nights, and the Anniversary Gala, which was won in convincing fashion by Teddington A after a fierce battle with Staines, with the B team finishing in a creditable third place, just beating the team from Acton. Forward Hillingdon and Feltham were the other invited teams. A feature of this gala was the inclusion of events for all age groups, ranging from Under 11s to Masters (over 25). A special silver swim hat was obtained for the swimmers to wear for this event. A highlight for one small boy from Feltham (and his dad) was his success in winning a Liverpool shirt signed by Michael Owen. The Deputy Mayor of Richmond, Councillor Beattie, presented commenorative trophies to all the teams taking part. The final celebration was a barbecue with jazz band held at Hampton

Pool and attended by nearly 200 current and former club members and

their families, on a lovely sunny evening at the end of May.

And lastly

To round off the first 25 years in a most satisfactory manner three swimmers achieved national success, *Gina Heyn* qualified for the National Long Course Championships in Manchester in three events, finishing in 8th place in the 50 metres freestyle. *Robert Garvey* and *Edward Rice* also achieved national qualifying times and performed creditably at the National Age Group Championships at Sheffield.

...And the 26th year started with further successes. Although narrowly beaten in the Teddington Challenge Trophy as a result of a disqualification in the last event, Teddington swimmers made up for it as, firstly, the Junior swimmers reached a best ever fourth place in the Milton Keynes District Junior League, and then the older swimmers, representing the borough of Richmond, achieved a place in the All London final of the Inter-Borough Competition for only the second time in the Club's history.

Awarded at the Novice Gala to top swimmers in 10 years category. Given by Mr & Mrs Laing

Interhouse Gala

<u>Coates Trophy</u> Was donated in 1982. Mr Cairns (who had been head of a primary school until his retirement) asked that it be given to a child of primary school age (Under 10) who had shown improvement over the last year. It is presented at the Interhouse Gala.

Clark Trophy. Given by a supporter of the club. It is presented at the Interhouse gala to the swimmer aged 14 or over who has shown the most improvement over the past 12 months.

<u>Daisy Eltham Trophy</u> Awarded at the Interhouse gala to the most improved swimmer aged 10-13

Club Championships

The 'CAIRNS TROPHY' was given to the Club by Mr A. P. Cairns, one of the Founder Members of the Club. Originally awarded to either a girl or a boy, this trophy is now awarded to a boy, 11 years old or under, showing keen spirit, unselfish attitude and good all round performance with improved times. It is presented at the Club Championships and was first presented in 1983 to Clair Morrall.

The 'GEORGE PINES TROPHY' was given by George Pines, formerly our club coach. This trophy is awarded to a girl, 11 or under, showing keen spirit, unselfish attitude and good all round performance with improved times.

The 'ARNOLD TROPHY', given by club supporters Mr & Mrs Arnold, is awarded to an Under 17 boy showing keen spirit, unselfish attitude and good all round performance.

The 'BOOTH TROPHY' was given by Jenny & David Booth, formerly Team Manager and Chairman of the Club. It is awarded to an Under 17 girl showing keen spirit, unselfish attitude and good all round performance.

The 'DENISE MEAKINS SHIELD' and the 'STEVEN MEAKINS SHIELD' are awarded to the girl and boy aged under 17 swimming the fastest times in the 100 metres Breaststroke in the Club Championships.

The 'BUTLER TROPHIES' are awarded to the boy and girl at the 400 metres handicap gala who achieve the greatest percentage improvement over their 'target time'


Appendix 2 Evolution of the club kit


From the start of the Club its colours were red and black. The first kit comprised a dark red costume or trunks, a fabric hat with red sides and white centre strip, and a white t-shirt with a large club logo in red on the front. The dark red costume had to be changed after a few years to a brighter red as the dark red became unavailable. A few years later the fabric hats were replaced by a simple red latex hat with the initials of the club in black. In the late 1980s swimmers were given the opportunity to purchase a red tracksuit (with some white), but this fell out of favour after a short time. A red sweatshirt was used for a number of years, and at the request of the swimmers a simple red t-shirt with the club name on the back was introduced.


By about 1990 the female swimmers in particular were expressing dissatisfaction with the red swimsuits, which were regarded as old-fashioned, as well as going slightly transparent after some period of use. Various costumes were tried, including plain black high-necked styles and other innovations which were now coming on to the market. Eventually the club settled on a black costume with red side panels which proved popular with swimmers of all ages and has, been the club kit ever since. Around 2000 a variation with the club logo on the back was introduced.

Meanwhile other additions to the kit included black jogging bottoms and shorts, red waterproof bags in various sizes and a black hat with the club initials for regular squad members. A new style of T-shirt, the 'tea-bag' was introduced for gala wear in the mid 1990s. This proved extremely popular and is the item of choice for most swimmers, as can be seen from the anniversary photo, in which almost everyone is wearing it. In 2002 a new tracksuit, in a much more comfortable fabric, made its appearance, followed by the introduction of a silver hat in 2003 for the 25th anniversary year.
